VARIANCE ANALYSIS

Overall - With one month in the fiscal year remaining and despite the pandemic, we are on track for a very positive result.

Both revenues and expenses are on track per the Fall Budget Update.

With 92% of the year gone we have received 91% of our planned revenues but spent just 84% of our planned expenses.

Revenue

Revenue is on track with the budget (-3%):

Provincial funding and COVID funding has been received in line with the initial budget.

The 27% reduction in Federal & First Nations revenues forecast in the Fall Budget update (\$12,046,517) was accurate. Lower Federal/First Nations tuition rates have been slightly offset by additional students and federal COVID support. Other revenues including SGF and donations have diminished from the pandemic in line with expenses (\$0.4 M)

Expenses

The \$4.0M (7%) favorable variance is due to operational changes offset by Housing renovations/ pandemic costs Schools are 3% under budget due primarily to the pandemic, reducing subs and other expenses Certificated salaries are 8% under budget (\$1.6M)

External Services is slightly overbudget due to Housing investment and forecast costs

Maintenmance is 8% overbudget due to pandemic costs, contract custodial, insurance over plan and additional R&M Pandemic-related slowdowns have reduced costs for Instructional Support, Supply and Transportation (\$3.8M)

BACKGROUND:

The Nation is building a new school with a planned opening for September 2022. The Nation and the Division have been working very successfully together for a number of years with a Co-Management Agreement to build capacity and collaborate on the operation of the current Northland school.

The majority of the students (89%) attending Fort McKay School are from the Fort McKay First Nation, and their tuition is funded by the Nation. Upon the new school opening they will presumably be transferring to it. The Nation had previously requested the transfer of the school land and building, to be converted to reserve land (2013).

Preparations would include transitional planning, legal research, administrative authority and the administrative requirements for the transition and transfer. Ultimately a recommendation to transfer the school land and building will be prepared by Administration for Board motion if the school is completed as planned.

BACKGROUND:

The Nation and the Division have been working very successfully together for a number of years with a Co-Management Agreement to build capacity through the operation of the current school. Effective September 2021 the Nation will be administering tuition payments rather than Indigenous Services Canada. Accordingly, in order for tuition payments for students attending the division school to continue, a new agreement is required.

The one-year agreement includes provision for tuition payments to the Division at the per student rate that provincial students are funded by the Government of Alberta. This will be an improvement on the previous cost-based model that generated financial uncertainty throughout the year, until the audited per student tuition rate was known and billings could be adjusted. It is anticipated that ISC will concur with the funding approach.

Provision is also made through the Co-Management Agreement for the Nation to guide school operations including staffing, planning and key support during this transitional year. The majority of the students (89%) attending the Fort McKay School are from the Fort McKay First Nation.

RISK ANALYSIS:

Low risk as the Division is collecting tuition from the Nation and requires this agreement to do so. Accordingly the risk is low.



Superintendent's Highlights

September 17, 2021

2021-2022 Welcome Message from the Superintendent

Tansi, Edlánat'e, Hello students, parents, guardians, staff, and community members.

Welcome back to another school year! I hope you had a safe and enjoyable summer. To our new families and staff, welcome to Northland School Division. As you know, we are still living through a challenging time due to COVID-19. With that in mind, I want to highlight some important health and safety strategies we have in place for students and staff.

Health and Safety Strategies

Some of the strategies exceed provincial requirements. These include:

- Mandatory use of masks for all staff and students in grades 4-12 and highly recommended for students K- grade 3.
- Mandatory use of masks for all students riding the school bus. All students must be registered to ride the school bus.
- Enhanced cleaning and hygiene protocols.
- Daily screening requirements before entering an NSD school or facility. This means all
 parents/guardians are required to screen their child using the Alberta Health Daily Checklist.
 Schools will be sending you a copy of the checklist. Staff are also required to complete the daily
 screening.
- Strict stay-at-home guidelines for individuals who feel unwell or have symptoms related to COVID-19.
- Cohort and physical distancing strategies. A cohort is defined as a group of students and staff
 who remain together. A cohort limits the mixing of students and staff throughout the day and
 reduces the number of people exposed if individual tests positive for COVID-19. This will be
 maintained as much as possible.
- Large assemblies will continue to be virtual rather than in-person. Same thing for performance
 activities such as singing, dancing, playing instruments, and theatre This will be re-evaluated on
 September 30th.
- Visitors are still not permitted in the school or workplace without an appointment. To make an appointment contact the school directly.
- Field trips and extracurricular sports can occur with health protocols in place.

The Board and Administration feel that maintaining many of the same health strategies from last year are necessary to reduce risk in the school communities we serve. The two changes we have made from last year to this year are with field trips and extracurricular sports. Allowing these activities to occur with health protocols in place is a small step in helping students experience some level of normalcy.

Alberta Education 2021-2022 School Year Plan

Alberta Education has been working closely with Alberta Health over the summer to determine health practices and measures that may be needed to support the <u>2021-2022 School Year Plan</u>.

As Alberta gets ready to lift all COVID-19 related restrictions this summer, students, parents and school staff can look forward to a normal school year in September 2021.

The plan was developed on the foundation of the following four principles that were established by government in collaboration with education partners:

- The safety of children, students and staff comes first.
- Children and student learning will continue.
- Provincial funding is still flowing to schools.
- School authorities have flexibility to do what is best for their community.

The plan for the upcoming school year is based on a return to normal. It also includes two contingency scenarios similar to those implemented in the current school year should the COVID-19 situation change. We will continue to monitor the COVID-19 pandemic and the direction from the Chief Medical Officer of Health.

Principal Start Up Meetings

The principal start up meetings were on August 25 and 26, 2021. The two days were packed with information regarding the school start up, the district and school Assurance Process for planning and reporting.

In particular, the following topics were shared and discussed with the principals:

- The specifics of the school re-entry plan for 2021-22 school year (specifically how to ensure safe operation of school amid the ongoing pandemic).
- The attendance monitoring process and the importance of consistently using PowerSchool.

- The district and school Assurance Process for planning and reporting.
- Information related to Teaching Quality Standards and professional growth planning.
- Information about how corporate services can support principals in their work providing education in their facilities.

Choice of Learning

NSD will continue to offer families a choice between in-school learning and an online school. For families not yet ready to send their child for in-school learning, parents and guardians can register their students to attend Northland Online School. To learn more visit www.northlandonlineschool.ca. We believe the more flexibility and choice we can provide for NSD students, the better chance they'll achieve success and achieve their goals and dreams.

Literacy and Numeracy

I am excited to share information about an initiative some NSD schools are embarking on to improve student learning in math for grades Kindergarten to Grade 8. NSD staff have been taking courses through the University of Calgary (U of C) called Math Minds. Math Minds is the teaching practice combined with the program schools will be using, called Jump Math. The teaching practice and program have been researched and have proven to be successful with helping students improve their math skills. Five NSD schools are piloting the Jump Math pilot. Some of our other schools are using the Jump Math program but are not involved in the pilot.

Like Numeracy, Literacy is an important learning foundation for student learning. NSD is continuing to focus on the division-wide learning approach to support students with reading and writing. I will be providing more details throughout the school year.

New Community Engagement Tool

I am excited to announce that NSD recently purchased a community engagement platform called "Bang the Table". Bang the Table is a web-based platform that is designed to support organizations with creating purposeful conversations.

The platform allows us to organize the following conversations:

- Open Environment: Share feedback on a forum, share a story, post feedback on a newsfeed.
- Mixed Environment: Fill out a survey, share feedback in a guestbook.
- Controlled Environment: Ideas circle, fill out a quick poll.

We will provide more information when we officially roll out Bang the Table. This platform is intended to support the ongoing engagement we have virtually or in-person with communities and school council members.

First Nations, Metis and Inuit Department

September Start Up

With a feeling of displacement, the 20 instructors took to heart the Superintendent's encouragement in the midst of yet another challenging Covid start up. She reassured them that a high-quality learning environment is about believing that every child can be the best they can be. In a culturally relevant and meaningful language program every child will love coming to school because they will become inspired, motivated and loved by a talented staff. The continuum for First Nations and Metis leadership in technology will include:

- online connections with principals, instructors and communities.
- supporting year planning to guide Culture, Language and Land Based Learning within schools.
- building interactive resources on local curriculum and projects underway for continued learning in syllabics and literacy.
- sharing PD promising practices on what to plan for in historical, seasonal themes and lesson activities from the program of studies, guides and what works best for respectful classroom engagement with Oral (screencastify video), TPR, TPRS, Communicative and Greymorning's picture method for accelerated second language acquisition.

Professional Learning Dates

Inspired by traditional values and cooperation, Supervisor/Assistant Supervisor will lead Instructors through planning of the four seasonal cycle.

• September 20 Professional Learning through Wicihtowin (Sharing) of Strategies section. Culturally responsive learning through safe social distancing could involve Elders/Knowledge keepers to collaboratively develop local teaching kits on harvesting language outdoors.

Classroom Champions

For the 2021-22 school year Northland School Division will continue to work with Classroom Champions. Classroom Champions is a nonprofit and charity. Classroom Champions connects volunteer Olympians, Paralympians, student Athletes, and professional Athletes to K-8 classrooms through a social and emotional based curriculum and mentorship experience. The goal is to improve

engagement, decrease bullying, and boost student achievement.



This year we have extended the schools who are participating with Classroom Champions, for the 2021-2022 school year the following schools are taking part; St. Theresa, Anzac/ Bill Woodward, Elizabeth, Gift Lake, and Paddle Prairie. Classroom Champions has been a great supporter of Northland School Division. During the 2020-2021 school year Elizabeth School students in grades 5 and 6 represent Alberta on February 1st 2021 when former NHL player Willie O'Ree, announced Lessons from Willie. This program is designed to bring the story of Willie O'Ree to light, and his experience as the first black hockey player in the NHL. The program includes social justice and anti-racism resources that can be used in all classrooms.

Over the last two years, Classroom Champions has granted Northland with scholarships which has enabled our students to participate in this amazing opportunity, for the upcoming school year the scholarship is approximately \$25,000.

Northland is excited to see what opportunities this partnership will bring to our schools this year.

Alberta Education - Enhancing Parent Engagement in Education

Alberta's government is committed to ensuring parents have a voice in their child's education.

On August 19, 2021, Minister of Education LaGrange announced the Alberta School Council Engagement Grant, which will provide a total of more than \$1 million to school councils to support collaboration between parents and schools. Parents are partners in Education, and through this grant, Alberta's government is putting dollars into the hands of parents on local school councils.

The Alberta School Council Engagement grant will provide each school council with \$500 to improve communication and engagement with parents in their local communities. The funds will be used for engagement activities such as broadening the number of school events that include parents, diversifying communication tools used by councils and activities that seek out the advice of other parents. This grant allows the department to work directly with school councils and focus on education priorities while strengthening the capacity of schools to improve student learning and enhance students' experience at school.


Collective Efficacy: Impact

We have been fortunate to hire Ms. Carey Wolfe as our new HR administrator. Carey brings a wealth of experience and expertise to her new role as she has previously worked in Human Resources and IT. We look forward to Carey joining our team on a full time basis.

Further, Northland School Division is looking at securing medical services from Homewood Health when the Division feels it necessary to secure Independent Medical Examinations for employees who are requesting to take the 90 days leave entitlement due to illness.



New Teacher Orientation

The new teacher orientation (virtual) occurred on August 25th and 26th. Twenty four teachers were invited and 21 teachers attended. Teachers included those who were new to Northland School Division (NSD) this year and teachers who joined NSD during the past year.

The orientation was designed to assist teachers:

- to give teachers a warm welcome to NSD.
- to gain a better understanding of Northland School Division and teaching in an Indigenous community.
- understand the importance of providing Indigenous connections, supporting cultural connections, and Language and Land Based Learning within teaching plans.
- understand the importance of the Truth and Reconciliation Calls to Action to *integrate*Indigenous knowledge and teaching methods into classrooms (62) and build student capacity for intercultural understanding, empathy and mutual respect (63).
- understanding the many services provided to teachers which include student services, payroll, benefits, and housing.
- making connections with other new teachers and planning Pedagogical Supervisors.

New Funding to Address COVID-19 Learning Disruptions

New funding is available for school authorities to jump-start targeted programming to support students in Grades 1 to 3 who are experiencing difficulties as a result of COVID-19-related learning disruptions.

Eligibility is determined through an application process that identifies the number of eligible students. The funding is allocated on a per student basis.

Funding will be available to offer small group intensive literacy and numeracy interventions for up to 16 weeks for Grade 1 to 3 students who are assessed as needing additional help.

We look forward to sharing additional information and updates as this process is further understood.
