On October 26, 2017, Northland School Division No.61 (NSD) celebrated a historic moment as an elected board of trustees returned to the jurisdiction. On May 4, 2017, the new <u>Northland</u> <u>School Division Act</u> received Royal Assent in the Legislative Assembly. Under the act, the new <u>governance structure</u> for NSD consists of 11 electoral wards; one trustee elected in each ward.

It is our pleasure to present the 2018-2021 Three Education Plan and the 2017-2018 Annual Education Results Report (3YP/AERR). The 3YP/AERR incorporates a new vision for NSD "Our students love to come to school in Northland" and what we heard from our school

NSD Facts

- Covering 288,347 sq. km's, NSD is located on Treaty 6 and 8 territories in northern Alberta.
- 95% of students are of either First Nation or Métis heritage.
- A new <u>Northland School Division Act</u> was proclaimed law on May 4, 2017.
- 1998 students in 20 schools.
- 475 staff.
- Partnerships with Tribal Councils, Métis settlements, municipalities, APPLE Schools, community agencies, school divisions, colleges and universities.

NSD Priorities

Outcome 1: NSD students are strong in identity, healthy and successful

Board Priority: Quality Education includes seeing and developing the gifts and talents in every child

- Increase student attendance by two percent (2%) to a target of 88%.
- Increase the number of students reading at grade level by 10%.
- Improve student performance on Provincial Achievement Tests and Diploma Exams.

Outcome 2: NSD is a leader for Indigenous education excellence

Board Priority: Families and communities are actively and meaningfully involved in their children's education

- Increase the quality and availability of Indigenous language instruction.
- Maintain and improve working relationships with First Nations.
- Define Indigenous education excellence.

Outcome 3: NSD is inclusive, each child's ways of knowing and ways of being are honoured, respected and essential.

Board Priority: Welcoming and caring environments exists in all NSD schools.

- Enhance the effectiveness of the community and understanding of student achievement that represents each child's ways of knowing and ways of being.
- Increase participation of students and value of students participating in experiential learning through land-based learning, cultural camps and or other means.
- Enhance capacity to deliver programs and services across the division.

Outcome 4: NSD has excellent teachers, school leaders and system leaders

Board Priority: The Board actively supports staff through their actions and encourages the community to do this as well.

- All NSD staff are well qualified and meet relevant professional standards.
- NSD is a system of excellence in the development of the foundational knowledge of First Nations, Métis and Inuit language and culture.
- NSD is a system of choice for employment.

Outcome 5: NSD is well governed and managed.

Board Priority: Purposefully inform and promote understanding of accomplishments, programs and successes

- Implement the NSD governance structure.
- Implement new administrative procedures.
- Implement the 2018-2019 communication plan which focuses on strengthening external communications, sharing successes, and supporting community engagement and involvement in the education system.
