Excellence in Learning



 Schools are continuing to focus on literacy through a practice of five strategies and SMART Learning. Literacy is stressed in all core subjects.



In recognition of World Read Aloud Day, a number of Northland staff read a story to students via Zoom. Dr. Nancy Spencer-Poitras, Superintendent of Schools, read *Where the Wild Things Are* by Maurice Sendak to Northland Online School students!

Priority 1: Excellence in Learning

Students achieve or exceed the standards set by Alberta Education in literacy and numeracy.

Outcome: Student success is supported by staff who ensure all students feel supported and have a sense of belonging within their schools.

Outcome: The Division uses consistent literacy and numeracy practices to support the growth of educators and student achievement.

Recent examples of how Northland achieves these outcomes

• Northland has developed a professional learning series for staff called Community of Practice. This approach to learning allows staff to learn and work together on common topics. For example, land-based learning, weaving Indigenous literature into instruction and teaching multi-grade classrooms.






In March, Father R. Perin School students participated in a fish camp at Winefred Lake. Students had the opportunity to learn from Elders and community members about the fish that inhabit the lake, how to catch a fish and how to prepare a fish for cooking purposes. Northland teachers use knowledge from these experiences to help students make connections to the curriculum.

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• A new relationship with Mindfuel Foundation is creating more opportunities for Northland students! A cohort of teachers participated in training to learn the basic use of Arduino kits, how to use the Arduino app

and learned the coding pattern of turning lights on and off on a circuit. Teachers have received kits and are now offering this exciting learning opportunity to students.

• 1547 students have participated in 13 TELUS World of Science -

Edmonton events so far this in 2021-2022!

- Our Attendance Operational Plan continues to be crucial in monitoring attendance, driving improvement and success.
- NSD has a subscription to Field Trip Zoom. This resource gives students a live and interactive experience. Whether it's visiting the zoo or exploring a museum, the platform covers all subjects and students are able to see the world virtually.
- We celebrate student success using social media (Facebook, Twitter), websites, letters, Board Highlights, media releases, newspapers, community newsletters, radio and television.





With support from the Innovation in First Nations Education Grant Program, NSD purchased two CNC Router Tables! Students in Wabasca and Conklin will be using the machines to create sets of syllabics. The syllabics will be used by students in Cree and Dene language classes.



In March, grade 2 students participated in a TELUS World of Science - Edmonton session called exploring liquids!

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Priority 2: Excellence in Leadership


Through excellent leadership practices, everyone feels welcome and valued.

Principal Meetings

 Senior Administration regularly host Zoom (video conference) meetings with principals. Professional learning is the main focus, developing leadership skills and current teaching practices.

Professional Learning

- Staff have regular opportunities to attend sessions related to leveraging the benefits of technology, literacy and numeracy.
- Cree/Dene instructors regularly learn and practice techniques for recording videos to support language, culture and land-based learning development.
- Elders and Knowledge Keepers educate instructors in their local context.

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• Division Wellness

• Housing and Maintenance

- Northland School Division (NSD) continues to prioritize housing improvement for teachers. 22 renovations have been completed! A number of other planned renovations have started.
- Construction is officially underway for the new Mistassiniy School https://tinyurl.com/42zvrn8s.
- NSD has set-up a permanent Career and Technology Studies (CTS) trailer in Paddle Prairie. A grand opening ceremony for the new CTS learning centre is in the planning stages.
- The new NSD home for Special Education, First Nations, Métis and Inuit and the Office of the Superintendent is located at the Northern Lakes College Wabasca Campus.

Excellence in Relationships

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Northland hosted a special presentation with award-winning and best-selling author Monique Gray Smith in March via Zoom Webinar! The presentation was called "Talking with and listening to kids about Truth and Reconciliation".

During this visit, Monique shared her personal journey of truth and reconciliation and how that journey has transformed her and her family. Throughout the evening, everyone in attendance learned ways to have conversations with children and young people about Canada's history, with a focus on Residential Schools.

Outcome: Parents and community members engage in their school community and are involved in their child's education.

Outcome: Parents, guardians, communities and education partners are informed and involved in Northland School Division (NSD) plans, programs and progress through ongoing and effective communication.

Outcome: Northland School Division fosters purposeful and productive working relationships to collaboratively advance division operations to support student learning.

Recent examples of how Northland achieves these outcomes

Community Relations

- The Board and Administration maintain regular contact with the communities we serve. Conversations are arranged virtually and in-person to keep them informed about good news stories related to student learning and discuss important education topics.
- Superintendent communicates regularly with students, staff, parents and community members on how NSD is moving forward with respect to programming.
- NSD organized a community engagement opportunity focused on updating its logo. During the engagement, students, parents/guardians, community members and staff were invited to vote on logo options presented by the Board and Administration or to submit an alternative idea. In April, the Board passed a motion to
- accept a new logo design submitted by a community member. To collect vote totals, NSD used an engagement platform called Bang the Table https://tinyurl.com/9xaeuuer.
- In April, NSD hosted a community engagement opportunity focused on gathering input from parents, guardians and community members for its 2022-2025 Assurance Plan. To gather input, NSD used an engagement platform called Bang the Table https://tinyurl.com/2p94yac6.
- Regular communication and relationship development with experts to help revitalize the Cree, Dene and Michif language
 - There is an ongoing collaborative effort between schools and communities to revitalize Indigenous language learning, which will occur as schools are slowly returning to normal activities which involves Elders and Knowledge Keepers to the school.

How is Northland achieving these outcomes?

- Relations with universities and educational organizations
- Northland and TELUS World of Science Edmonton (TWOSE) celebrated the partnership during a presentation at the CASS First Nations, Métis and Inuit Education Gathering in March. Under this partnership, TWOSE is helping NSD teachers deliver innovative science-related experiences to students. With support from Northland Elders and Knowledge Keepers, TELUS

World of Science-Edmonton incorporates Indigenous traditional knowledge alongside western science concepts.

 Northland students are flashing university

identification cards while attending high school. In 2021, NSD signed a five-year agreement that will give students access to dual credit courses.

• In March, NSD organized a presentation to share its story about relationships and how it supports Truth and Reconciliation, student learning and leadership. Northland has established a culture of collective efficacy, which refers to staff having a shared belief on having a positive impact on student learning. During the presentation, Director of First Nations, Métis and Inuit Education Debbie Mineault shared a number of resources Northland is currently using to achieve excellence in learning, while weaving Indigenous knowledge, language, culture and

the history and legacy of Residential Schools, into the lessons. For example, Northland educators are using technology tools and decoding strategies to help students learn to speak, read and write in Cree or Dene.
