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### **Draft Policy One presented at Board Meeting**

The Northland Board received Northland School Division’s Board Policy One as information. This draft policy will reflect NSD’s approach to education programming. We are requesting that Local School Board Committees review this document and provide feedback. The division is also working on a process for gathering additional feedback. ### **Draft Policy – Sexual Orientation and Gender Identity**

The draft policy for Sexual Orientation and Gender Identity passed 2<sup>nd</sup> reading. The draft is a commitment by NSD to maintain a safe and welcoming environment for all members of the school community. This includes those students, staff and families who identify or are perceived as lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, transsexual, two spirit, queer (LGBTQ) or questioning their sexual orientation, gender identity or gender expression. The policy also outlines support for student groups, including Gay-Straight Alliances or Queer Straight Alliances. All school boards in Alberta are required to develop a policy in relation to sexual orientation and gender identity before March 31, 2016. ### **St. Theresa School presentation**



St. Theresa School in Wabasca-Desmarais updated the Northland Board on its progress related to the division-wide Literacy Initiative and the *Attendance Improvement Initiative ‘Every Day Counts’*. Mandi MacLennan, Principal and Shelley Stevenson, Vice-Principal, highlighted the school’s literacy plan that includes weaving First Nation and Métis resources into classroom practice and developing oral language competency. The school has a full-time Literacy Lead Teacher who supports other teachers, organizes family literacy nights, lunch-time literacy clubs, home reading programs and writing contests.



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The attendance focus at St. Theresa School is paying off. MacLennan and Stevenson presented student attendance data that indicates consistency and improvement. In October 2015, 73% of the student population attended school at a rate of 90% or better. Since the initiative began in September, 2014, the average for students attending at the same rate is 61%. The school has a rewards program that recognizes classrooms, individual students and parents. For example, parents are entered into a draw if their child attends at a rate of 90% or better. In addition to incentives, the school has hired a second family liaison to support attendance, developed an attendance intervention record and deliver key messages about attendance at staff meetings, in newsletters, on Facebook, on school website and at school events. ### **Elizabeth School highlights**

Elizabeth School Principal Rick Horon delivered a snap-shot to the Northland Board about what's happening in the school community. The school continues to increase its communication to parents by using newsletters, Facebook, school website and a texting app called Remind. The presentation highlighted the school's Accountability Pillar Survey results. They saw improvement in student, teacher and parent agreement that students are taught the attitudes and behaviors that will make them successful at work.

Overall student attendance at the school has been over 90% for the past few years. They received a divisional plaque for achieving the second highest overall attendance in 2014-2015. Horon says the high rate of attendance at Elizabeth is a result of creating an inviting, caring atmosphere, relevant teaching for students and incentive programs such as pizza lunches, perfect attendance race and recognition at assemblies. Horon also highlighted the



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schools community partnerships in the settlement and surrounding area, cultural activities, community events, inter-school sports, extra-curricular activities, Career and Technology Foundation classes, literacy and numeracy instruction and resources and field trips. ### **School hockey program video**



The most celebrated game in Canada is making a difference for a northern Ontario school. The Northland Board watched a CBC News video about a school hockey program in Sioux Lookout, Ontario. The program dubbed “hockey academy”, was started in 2012 by a gym teacher in Kenora who noticed that some kids had no problem showing up regularly for hockey practice but had poor attendance when it came to school.

22 of the 23 students who participated in year one have since graduated and the program now exists in three communities around the region. According to the school principal, student attendance at the Sioux Mountain Public School has increased 25% since the program began. Click on the website link to view the story
